He was a fellow at the Institute for Human Sciences (Vienna), a fellow of the John Simon Guggenheim Memorial Foundation, a recipient of the ACLS' Frederick Burkhardt Residential Fellowship, and a member of the Institute for Advanced Study, Princeton (School of Social Science).
