LCC Scholarship Recipients

Ioanis Cuko, Fabiola Pinto, Mohammad Almour, and Li Gao Receive LCC Scholarship

The Language and Culture Center awards four scholarships each term to returning students who best combine academic excellence and leadership with international awareness and cross-cultural understanding. Traditionally, one full scholarship honors Joyce Merrill Valdes, the founder and first director of the LCC. A second full scholarship honors Joseph O. Davidson, who served as director of the LCC for 22 years before retiring in 2006. These two full scholarships cover the cost of tuition, fees, and medical insurance for one term of study in the Intensive English Program. In addition, the LCC awards merit scholarships of \$1500 each for one term of study in the Intensive English Program. At the fall graduation ceremony on Thursday, December 13, 2012, the LCC awarded the Valdes scholarship to **Ioanis Cuko**, the Davidson scholarship to **Fabiola Vidal Pinto**, and the two merit scholarships to **Mohammad Aldmour** and Li Gao.

Students in F-1 status need to make sure they maintain their student status. If you are planning to travel during the break, please see a student counselor so we can update your travel plans in our system. If you are traveling outside the U.S., you must bring your I-20 to an LCC student counselor so we can sign it and give you permission to return to the U.S.

If you plan to study in the LCC for the summer (May 14 – August 8), you must register online for classes beginning May 7th. If you do not register on time, you cannot attend class. Please go to the LCC website for more information about registering for the summer.

The LCC has three terms throughout the year: spring, summer, and fall. As an F-1 student, you are required to study in every term unless you are given permission to

take a vacation term. If you want to take a vacation in the summer, you must first ask for permission. To ask for permission, please go to the LCC website and log into the LCC Student System to request a vacation. The LCC will then check to see if you qualify for a summer vacation.

If you plan to transfer to a new school for the summer or fall, please see a student counselor in room 118 or 120 for more information. You have 60 days from graduation to complete your transfer to the new school.

If you have any doubts or question, please see a LCC student counselor. It is very important that you maintain your student status. It is not easy to get your student status back if you lose it.



Culture Bump

Culture Bump

A culture bump occurs when two or more people enter a situation with different expectations about a behavior. It can be caused by: communication styles, behaviors involving the use of time, space or speaking, physical objects such as clothing or artifacts, or even the architecture or decor of a location. In short, it is a cultural difference - a "hiccup" in our interactions.

People go through an adjustment cycle when they move from one culture to another. One model is the W Curve of cultural adjustment. While there are other models, this one seems to fit most folks. In the order in which they occur, the stages are:

Honeymoon

Feelings of a dream come true. Everything is new and exciting.

Culture Shock

Physical culture shock

Tiredness, inability to concentrate, change in sleep patterns.

Psychological culture shock

Extreme homesickness, fear of being able to succeed.

Initial Adjustment

Still missing back home but more connected, more self-confidence.

Acceptance and Integration

Stop trying to change host culture or making constant comparisons and develop strategies for day-to-day living

What stage of the Cultural Adjustment Cycle are you in now?

After being in the United States for more than eight months, it is still hard for me to get used to it. Studying far away from parents and friends is not a piece of cake. I used to think that living miles away from parents would be cool, but the fact is, it is more difficult than I thought it would be. The Mental Isolation stage is where I think I am now. In the first place, considering where I stand now, I didn't think that I would have these kinds of problems----whether physically or mentally. But in reality, I have found it difficult to adjust to life in America. For example, two months ago, I experienced homesickness, which I was very upset with. I felt that I couldn't live here anymore. I called my dad, and while I was crying, he told me, "Son, not everybody chooses his career, but once he chooses it, he should be confident with his choice." Once he talked to me, I felt confident in myself. Furthermore, when I take a comprehensive exam like TOEFL or IELTS, and the result is not good enough for me to enroll in the university, I get very angry and upset. In addition to that, sometimes, I might not be able to study hard before the test or focus during the test. These kinds of troubles can make any human being lose his faith in every new step he takes. But once I understand what mistakes I make, it makes me stronger. I always tell myself that I learn form my failures.

I have been in America for three years already. I think I'm in "Final Adjustment". The American culture began to make sense after my English got better. 
