Lack of consistent access to enough food for an active, healthy life.

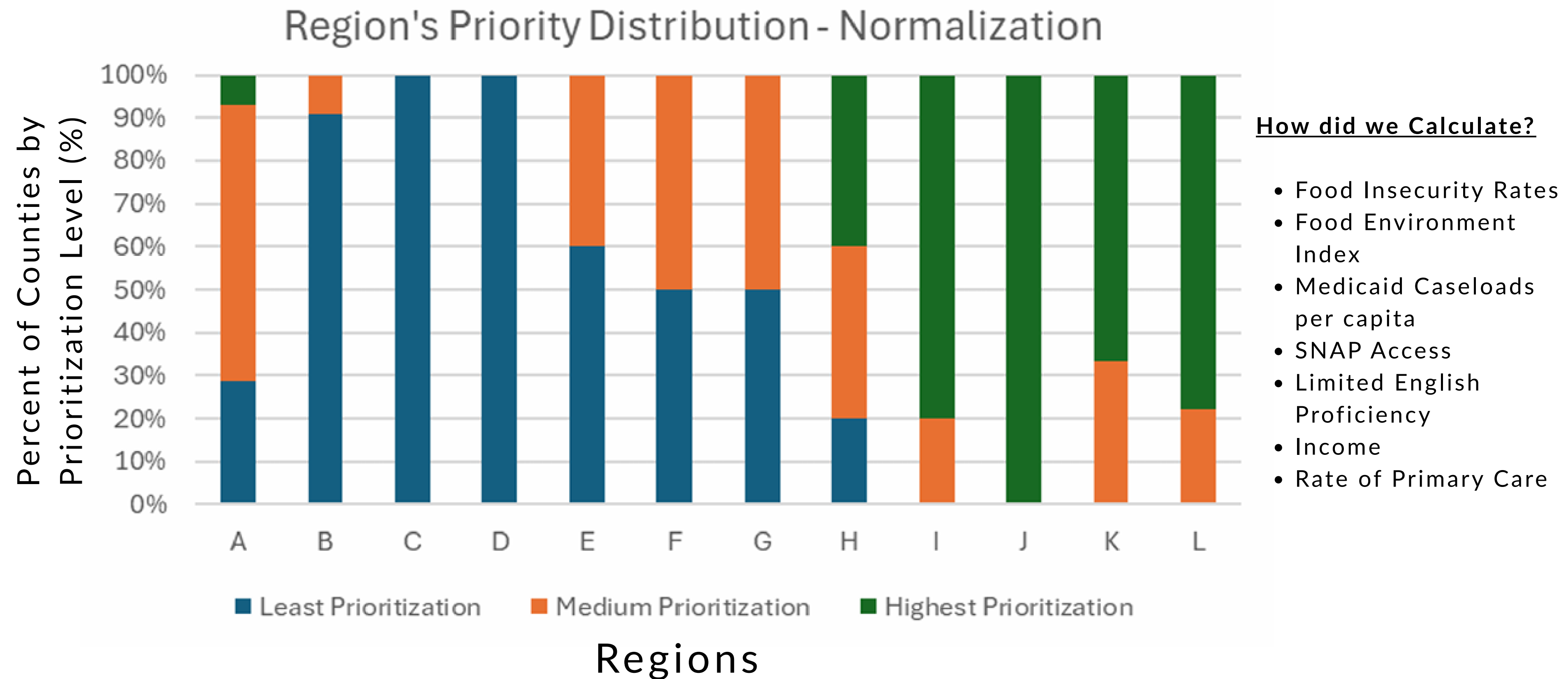


Individuals who speak English "less than very well" as classified by the U.S. Census Bureau.

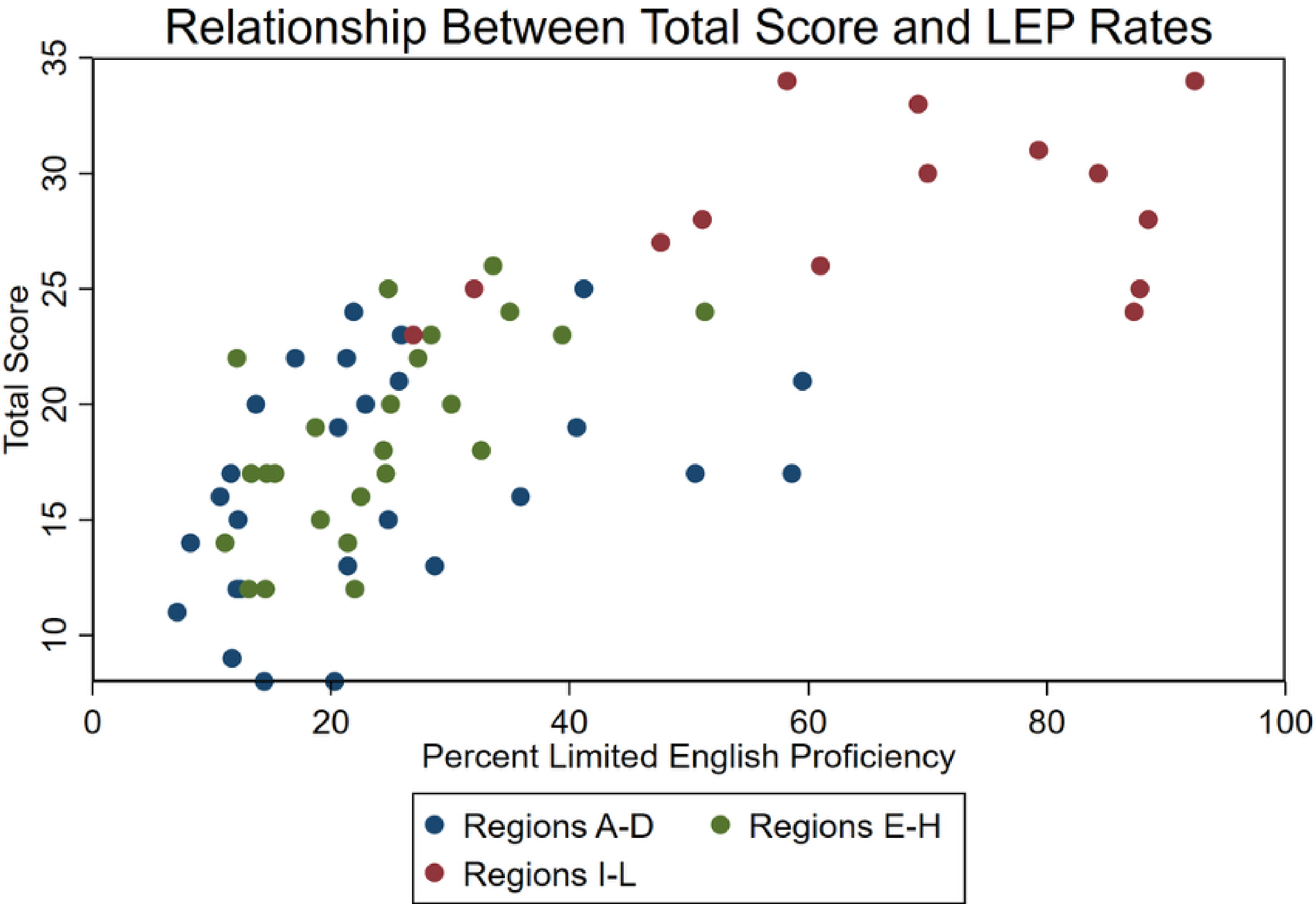

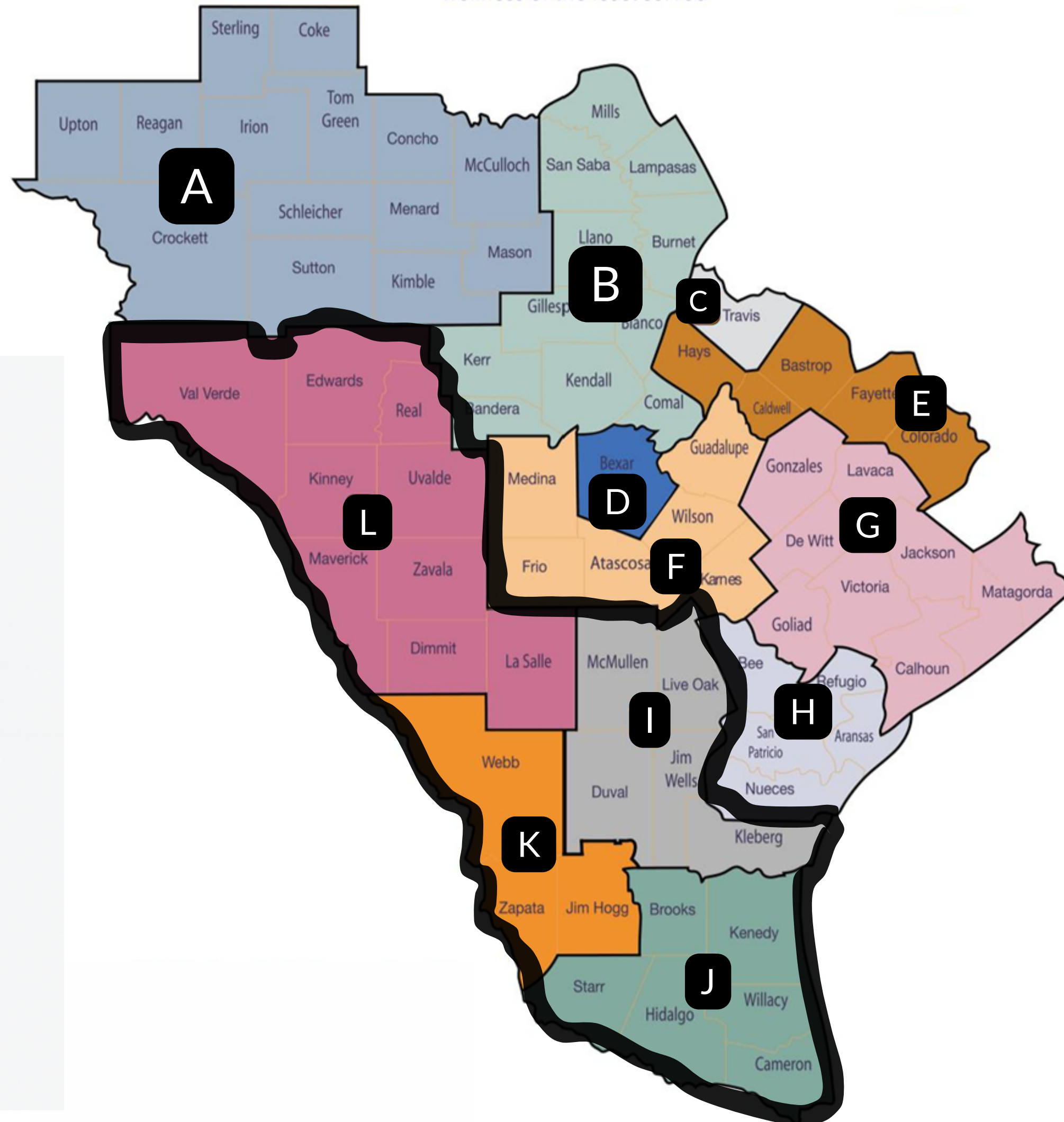

SNAP Participation Rate	-0.209**	0.102
